Later, I saw the letter, on the next page, from Montreat Director of Athletics, Garrett Jones, and initially was just going to send over some money. As I went to go grab my card, I knew that my \$100 would be just a small drop in the bucket to help. I thought with the magazine prep going on, maybe there was a way that a bunch of small drops could actually fill the bucket and help more. So, I reached out to their athletics account to get permission and here we are. I know if you are reading this, you most likely are already past the donation part. Thank you for doing that! Again, even if you aren't able to donate, prayers work too!

Letter from Montreat College Director of Athletics

Our coaches, staff, and faculty have been overwhelmed with everyone who has reached out sending thoughts and prayers our way. They have been deeply felt and welcomed. In an extremely catastrophic time for our campus and region, it has been so humbling to see everyone's love and support for our college, students and student-athletes. I'm excited to report that all our students and staff are safe. All students have evacuated campus and relocated to safe places. Much of our staff has also evacuated the area and are safe. We have so much to be grateful for in that regard.

Many of you have reached out wanting to know how you can help our school and athletic department, and it's been difficult to even begin to process where to start. Tragically, we have had some employees lose their homes and all personal items.

From an athletic facility standpoint, our gym and everything inside is most likely a total loss. This is the central hub for our athletic department and houses our weight room and athletic training room. The following sports contain offices in that facility: Baseball, Men's and Women's Basketball, Men's and Women's Track and Field, Men's and Women's Cross Country, Men's and Women's Tennis, Men's and Women's Golf, Volleyball, Men's and Women's Wrestling, Cheer, Dance and Men's Lacrosse.

Our number one need right now is prayer for our community and region as the death total tragically continues to climb. This is an unprecedented tragedy for our area. However, many of you have asked how you can help, so I wanted to get something out.

The college has set up two separate funds that you can donate to financially: the first is a Campus Recovery Fund, and the second is a Community Benevolence Fund. Every dollar will directly aid in rebuilding our campus and supporting members of our community who have experienced significant property damage or loss.

Please understand that our programs above have lost virtually everything from our gym. All equipment, gear and uniforms are gone. If you want more specific items about each sport, please feel free to contact me directly.

We are blessed with tremendous leadership at the college and a Board of Trustees that cares deeply about this place. Although the days ahead have a lot of unanswered questions, I couldn't be more excited about the future of Montreat College athletics. We serve a big God, and I continue to be blown away by how He uses His people to do amazing things even in the midst of challenging times. 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

I know we are all excited for the season to arrive and games to be here! Leagues will start releasing their own preseason rankings and media days over the next week!





The CCAC appears to be top-heavy once again. With the defending champions, Roosevelt, moving up to NCAA D2, we anticipate that the current CCAC tournament champions, IU Northwest, will emerge as early favorites. The Redhawks bring back five starters, three of whom earned All-CCAC honors last season, including the sole returning First Team CCAC player, Dannie Smith. As the season begins, they seem to be in a league of their own.

Nevertheless, don't underestimate ONU and IU South Bend in the CCAC. Both teams are exceptionally well-coached and, while they may have lost some elite talent, they are likely to improve as the season progresses!

If they can maintain their health, Saint Francis (IL) is a team worth watching, as they could make notable strides in the standings this year. The return of Aitor Anabitarte from injury, alongside Rahmel Davis, could position them as serious contenders!

This season is set to showcase five or six teams vying closely for position within just a few games of one another, paving the way for another thrilling season and an unpredictable CCAC tournament!

The Redhawks were one of the most formidable teams in the nation during the latter part of last season, having lost only four games in the second semester on their journey to claim the CCAC tournament championship. In the 2024-25 season, the Redhawks will see the return of all five starters from last year, including first-team All-CCAC selection and CCAC Newcomer of the Year, Dannie Smith. Additionally, second-team members Trace Williams and Anthony Taylor will also be back in action for the Redhawks. Demarius Splunge, Jaylen Jennings, and Ladaion Barnes are returning as well. This means that 82% of last season's scoring is coming back.

Other Contenders



ONU boasts one of the most tradition-rich programs in the league. They have celebrated six consecutive CCAC Player of the Year winners, including last year's 2nd team All-American, Tyler Schmidt. The Tigers face a significant challenge as they return only 23% of their scoring from the previous season. Caleb Swearingen is the only returning starter, and you can expect his role to expand significantly. The same goes for Daniel Murphy, Caleb Corro, and Eli Edwards. Coach Nick Birkey is an exceptional coach, and he will have the Tigers competing at a high level by the end of the season!



It's perfectly reasonable to wonder why we're so enthusiastic about a team that finished with a 10-16 record last year. However, the Saints faced significant challenges due to injuries, including the absence of Aitor Anabitarte, who missed the entire season. The last time we saw the Spaniard, he was dominating the scoreboard and leading the Saints in scoring, earning him 2nd team All-CCAC honors. If he returns to full health, he is a genuine candidate for CCAC Player of the Year. With him alongside 2nd team selection Rahmel Davis and other talented players, this team has the potential to make some noise.



IU South Bend consistently contends for a CCAC title. Replacing the departed senior and two-time All-American Dejon Barney is a significant challenge, but the Titans are not lacking in talent as they bring back Jylen Petty, Quentez Columbus, and Nick Mullen. Additionally, they have welcomed two promising transfers, Kyle Millender and Shawn Brown. However, their depth will rely heavily on younger players, making this a team that could improve steadily throughout the season as those young talents gain experience.



Saint Xavier bids farewell to Cedric Johnson, who ranked second in scoring in the CCAC last season. However, they still boast a strong core of returning players, highlighted by Andre Brandon (2nd Team All-CCAC) and Kevin Bishop (Honorable Mention All-CCAC). Additionally, they will incorporate D2 transfer Jordan Jackson along with a roster of JUCO players to bring in valuable experience.

Sleeper Teams



Oh, when the saints, oh, when the saints, oh, when the saints come marching in! Let's give a nod to Saint Ambrose, adding to our trio of saints here in the CCAC! Ray Shovlain has been the head coach for the Bees for an impressive 41 seasons. Last year, they finished sixth in the league but demonstrated their ability to compete with nearly everyone; the only top team they didn't split games with was Roosevelt. They are returning all but one player from last year, and although they need to play more consistently, Will Spriggs (2nd Team All-CCAC) and his teammates certainly have the potential to take that next step.



I'm unsure if the Trolls can clinch the league title in Coach Osborn's first year. However, what I do know is that Coach Osborn has been part of a winning program for the past six seasons as an assistant at Indiana Wesleyan. Additionally, he has recruited two standout guards: Julius Byrd from South Suburban and Marcus Green from Chaffey. Green was a joy to watch during his freshman year at Arizona Christian. Like many freshmen, he experienced some ups and downs, but he managed to score in double figures in seven games. Julius Byrd is a tough guard with excellent passing skills. While the Trolls may lack size, I anticipate they will be a formidable challenge for opponents throughout the season!

After being voted out of the GPAC in their final year as an NAIA member, Jamestown enters the NSAA and is poised to bring excitement to this last season of the league.

The competition in this league is once again wide open. Mayville State will return the reigning Player of the Year, Darren Jones. Dickinson State, overall, has the best group of returns back. Jamestown and Bellevue probably the two most talented teams overall in the league.

Ultimately, Bellevue is likely to be the favorite in the NSAA, but as we've seen in previous years, expect 3-4 teams to be in contention all the way up to the final week of the season.

With the addition of 6'8" freshman Matt Mathok, the Bruins appear poised to defend their NSAA title.



Dickinson State is set to welcome back nearly all of its players, including their entire all-league backcourt of John Evans (NSAA First Team) and Trey Stevens (NSAA Second Team). Additionally, big man Gus Wright, who sat out the second semester last year, is also poised to return, making the Blue Hawks a serious contender. Coach Derek Selvig has done an excellent job with the Blue Hawks, and you can anticipate their strong push for an NSAA title this year!



The Jimmies are currently experiencing a "layover" in the NSAA before making their transition to NCAA D2. As a result, their non-conference schedule features a blend of D2 and NAIA matchups. They welcome back three players who received All-GPAC honors, including Silas Bennion, who was named to the GPAC First Team. In total, the Jimmies are bringing back ten players and will also be adding four transfers to enhance their roster. For context, last season, the Jimmies achieved a record of 5-1 against NSAA opponents, with their sole loss being a narrow five-point overtime defeat to Dickinson State.

Former Mayville State head coach, Darren Tighe, begins his second year at Dakota State. The Trojans welcome back NSAA Freshman of the Year Brayden Pankonen, along with Mayville State transfers Taine Mitchell and Colby Dillenbeck, both of whom redshirted last season. Additionally, they expect to have Ethan Slaathaug returning from his torn ACL. A trio of transfers will also join the team. Aiden Jensen from Mount Marty will add size, Spencer Utchison from the University of Iowa brings a strong wing presence, and senior guard Kam Givens will contribute valuable leadership. The rest of the roster includes promising freshmen who will need to mature quickly!



Mayville State's Darren Jones earned Third Team All-American honors last season after being named NSAA Player of the Year. The Comets also welcome back JJ White, who averaged nearly 10 points per game. This year, they will have a new and larger supporting cast. Justin Fisher joins from Chandler-Gilbert Community College, where his team won a league championship, and he was recognized as an All-League player and named Defensive Player of the Year. It promises to be an exciting team to watch once they start clicking!

The American midwest Conference is a 10-team conference that consists of teams from ARKANSAS AND Missouri.

Last year, we mentioned that the AMC could significantly improve its national standing by securing victories in national tournaments. Central Baptist made an impressive deep run, reaching the National Quarterfinals, while Columbia (MO), as the 15-seed, put up a fierce fight against NAIA powerhouse Indiana Wesleyan in what might have been the best game of the opening round, ultimately losing 105-99 in double overtime.

Both Central Baptist and Columbia are expected to be the top contenders for the league title once again, as they return a majority of their rosters.

William Woods will also be in contention. Coach Jordan Ashton has assembled an experienced and talented group, along with some promising transfers to strengthen the team's depth. Missouri Baptist is coming off a successful season with 21 wins, competing for the AMC tournament title. Following the season, Assistant Taylor Jarvis has been promoted to head coach.
With a lot of "shifting" going on around the NAIA, the door is open for teams, all across the NAIA to maybe get an extra team into the tourney. As of right now, we think William Woods could give the AMC an at-large option this season (predicting that CBC and Columbia win the auto-bids).

The Mustangs will undoubtedly feel the absence of Deshawn Corprew; however, they return four starters from last year's team that made it to the NAIA Quarterfinals. Leading the charge is Sage Borbon, who was named the AMC Tournament MVP. Alongside him, Jonas Carlisle, Wade Williams, and Devin Foster, who led the AMC in blocked shots, provide a solid starting core for the Mustangs. Savaughn Smith is also returning to the team. Rejoining the Mustangs after a year at D2 is 2023 All-Conference selection Gabe Johnson. His D2 teammate, Ddaquarius Harris, will join him as well.



The reigning AMC Player of the Year and a member of the Third Team All-American, Collin Parker, is returning alongside Isaiah Holden (AMC Second Team) and Harrison Vickers (AMC Third Team) to lead the Columbia team, which retains five of its top eight players from last year's national tournament squad. Additionally, the Cougars are welcoming Seth Larson (Second Team All Heart) and NCAA D2 transfer Kai Steinman. Missouri 6A state champion, Nashawn Davis, is also anticipated to make a significant contribution this year! A group who has a shot to get some good non-conference wins early!

Other contenders



William Woods possesses the talent to vie for an AMC title. A significant factor in this is the return of two All-AMC First Team players: Henry Shannon III and Francis Okwuosah, who was also named AMC Newcomer of the Year, along with Nate Schwartze, who made the AMC Third Team. The Owls are also bringing in D'Mari Wiltz, a former honorable mention All-AMC selection, and Ahlante Askew from John Brown. With their impressive size, scoring ability, and depth, they have the potential to be a formidable team if they can bring it all together!



Taylor Jarvis steps into the role of head coach as he shifts over one seat following PresTon Ingram's departure (D2 Maryville). There's a lot to be excited about regarding MoBAP as the season approaches. Breven McMullen (HM All-AMC) returns a solid group of five players, all of whom had significant playing time, with four starting games for the Spartans last season. Jarvis's inaugural recruiting class has the potential to be impressive. beginning with Taiden Conner (NW Kansas Tech), a JUCO Top 100 player and honorable mention. Additionally, they have secured two D2 transfers: Austin Lewis (Midwestern State) and Thai Elder (Cameron). JUCO transfers Zeke Thompkins (Ellsworth) and Moses Gordon (Polk) are also expected to contribute valuable depth and experience.

Sleeper Team



This marks Mission University's inaugural official year in the NAIA, but they have faced NAIA teams for several years, equipping them with the experience needed to compete. Last season, they achieved a 4-3 record against AMC opponents, despite having an entirely new team and struggling with consistency. This year, they welcome back six of their top seven players, including Jacques Thomas and Eli'jah Smith, who have proven to be challenging for NAIA teams. Additionally, Dallas Meinders, who stepped in for his father, has done an excellent job of recruiting players with size to strengthen the team.

The firepower is further enhanced by Ty Henry (2nd Team All-Heart), Korey Jones (HM All-Heart), along with Ahmed Mahgoub and Nick Whittick. Coach Sean Dooley and his staff have also brought in Kaimen Lennox from Wayne State (MI), adding another scoring threat to the team.

Other contenders



Carlos Hines (HM All-Heart) and Ajante Hogan (HM All-Heart) are back for the Bobcats, who finished last season with a 20-12 record and secured a tournament title. They welcome Devin Tomlinson, who claimed a national championship with Freed-Hardeman last year, along with Lamar Lovelace from Niagara CC, who was recognized as a First Team JUCO All-American last season. Chris Peoples from D2 LeMoyne-Owen led his league in assist-to-turnover ratio last year, and Aaron Miller, who started games for D2 Western New Mexico, will bring valuable experience to the team.



Four starters are back from a team that finished with a 23-10 record last season, which included a run to the Heart Tournament Title game. The Wildcats qualified for the NAIA national tournament, securing a significant road victory over SAGO before falling to Evangel in the round of 32. Baker is bringing back four All-Heart performers, including first-team selection Quentin Harvey. Overall, the Wildcats are returning 85% of their scoring from the previous season. Additionally, they welcome D2 graduate transfer Kaimen Lennox, who made 28 starts during his two years at Wayne State (MI).



With the loss of four players from the 1st and 2nd All-Conference teams, Coach Matt Sherman and his staff hit the transfer market this summer, bringing in seven transfers to strengthen their chances for a championship title. This group is both long and athletic, and they should complement each other effectively. Notably, Brandon Tchouya from Laramie County has the potential to emerge as one of the top players in the league due to his impressive size and length. The Eagles also welcome Mario Fantina from Ark-Monticello, Kai Jordan from Columbia (CA), Destin Jenkins from Cerro Coso CC, Bol Tong from Wayland Baptist, Will Hemme from Northwest WY, and Kevin James from Dominican.



Another team who has lost some key players from the previous year. However, one standout aspect we've observed from Head Coach Todd Lorenzen, both at Mount Marty and Graceland, is his exceptional coaching ability and the solid foundation he has built for the team. The Yellow Jackets welcome back two returning starters: Darrius Davis and Carson Busch. Additionally, Kevin Cook, who redshirted last season, shows potential as a breakout candidate. Cole Bowen from Mount Marty was selected as an Honorable Mention in the all-GPAC last year. Completing the roster are Micah Lamberth, who started 27 games at D2 CSU Pueblo, and Siddiq Canty, who won a national title at National Park. With this lineup, Graceland is poised to compete for the Heart!

Sleeper Teams



Missouri Valley finished last season with an 11-13 record, but they bring back all five starters, including five HM ALL-Heart members. While their scoring was fairly balanced last year, there's potential for a player like Jace Lance to make significant strides. If you followed our magazine last year, you're aware of Jace's heart condition that almost took his life. It was inspiring to see him back on the court last season. Two years removed from that incident and a full offseason, I think we see a big year out of him, which in return will elevate those around him. MVC has added size and depth, along with the experience needed to climb the HEART standings this year, we will see If they can make a run at a national tourny bid!

The KCAC has successfully placed two teams into the Round of 16 in three of the last four years. The only exception was in 2023, when no teams made it to Kansas City. Much like the GPAC, they seem to struggle with advancing past the NAIA quarterfinals.

As we approach the 2024-25 season, it is expected that OKWU will be the leading favorite. The Eagles feature one of the top duos in the nation, with two genuine NAIA Player of the Year candidates: Jaden Lietzke and DJ Talton Jr. Additionally, Kansas Wesleyan's Alex Littlejohn, another NAIA Player of the Year contender, will aim to guide KWU to a KCAC title.

The competition beyond these top two teams could be quite intriguing, with Saint Mary (KS), Southwestern, Evangel, and McPherson all poised to be in the running as well.

DO NOT UNDERestimate their talent just because many of their players graduated after last season's NAIA quarterfinal run. Notably, they redshirted five freshmen last season, preparing for the return of all their fifth-year players. Coach Capel and his staff clearly have confidence in these young athletes, as they only recruited two transfers: Bryce Ware from Jacksonville College and Dane Foster from Lincoln Land CC.



There's no denying that Southwestern experienced the most considerable losses in the KCAC last season. Nevertheless, it's difficult to overlook their potential, as Coach Matt O'Brien has proven skilled at tackling KCAC challenges, with an impressive record of 13 consecutive winning seasons and seven seasons with 20 or more wins in the past eight years. Leading the returning players is Justin DeMaria (HM All-Conference), while Zach Hidalgo aims to build on a solid sophomore performance. To strengthen their roster, the Builders have tapped into the transfer market, bringing in four players between 6'5" and 6'8" to enhance size at every position, with four of the five transfers coming from D2 programs. Additionally, keep an eye on freshman Jesse Ledbetter.



Mary (KS) stood out as one of the leading teams in the KCAC towards the end of last season, significantly improving their performance. They are excited to bring back key players, including Jordan Brown (HM All-Conference), Joey Schultz (HM All-Conference), Bryce Johnson, Tre Alexander, and Kaeden Bonner. Last year, they earned recognition as one of the top defensive teams in the KCAC and have now strengthened their rim protection with the addition of 6'11 Maduk Deng (Elgin CC). Furthermore, they are also welcoming Damare Smith (Cowley CC) to the roster.

McPherson is excited to welcome back Colin Storr (KCAC Newcomer of the Year/2nd Team All-KCAC), Curtis Rose (Honorable Mention All-KCAC), along with two other players who each averaged close to 10 points per game. 


RIP Mark Mitchell


